Two New Members Unopposed

NOMINATIONS LAST NIGHT

In five wards—Lammas, Grovenor, North and South Hanwell and Northolt—there will be contests on Monday week, Nov. 2. The two new councillors elected yesterday are—

MOUNT PARK—Mr. Edgar Allen, 29, Corton-road, Ealing; hon. treasurer of the Ealing Conservative Association. Mr. Allen takes the place of Mr. Sayers.

GRANGE—Mr. J. D. Knight, 51, Cullingington-road, West Ealing; the former borough electrical engineer. Mr. Knight takes the place of Mr. Sayers.

Town Hall Ban For The Present

LABOUR SUSPICIONS

Sequel to "Spanish Civil War" Meeting

FOR the present neither Communists nor Fascists will be allowed to hold meetings in the Victoria Hall any hall under the control of the Ealing Town Council. A decision to this effect was taken at a meeting of the Council on Tuesday. It was a sequel to the disturbance at the recent "Spanish civil war" meeting in the Victoria Hall.

Before the Council was a recommendation of the Victoria Hall Committee that the Halls Letting Manager should be instructed not to let halls to either Communists or Fascists "in the future." After a discussion the words, "at present" were substituted.

Cir. Rockman said he was not in favour of preventing people expressing their opinions in public halls. "I believe that the more you suppress the more you foster," he said. "It is not the people who hire halls who want their meetings smashed up; a disturbance usually made by someone who is not a party to the meeting being held. If you had said you were not prepared to let the hall to pseudo-military organisations or to people who parade in uniform, I could understand it very well."

NOT THE SCOUTS? Aid Mrs. Taylor asked if Cir. Rockman would exclude boy scouts from the halls. Cir. Rockman: No! Not the boy scouts. I think it should be known that I refer to uniforms. I refer to those used by political bodies. I refer in particular to the Fascists. But I see no reason why merely because they are Fascists they should be excluded from the use of the halls. I agree with the Communists. I want to make this protest against the recommendation, and to record my vote against it.

Aid. Cobbin said the committee had certain halls that needed protection. Moreover, rent was obtained for the halls, and the committee wanted it in big income as could get. "We reserve the right to close the halls if disturbances are likely," he added.

Mr. Woodward said that it was his feeling that at a later date every organisation in the borough should be invited to be represented on a coronation committee. He thought, however, that the preliminary decisions should be made by a committee of the whole Council.

LOCAL PLANS FOR CORONATION

Council to Hold Special Meeting

Preliminary steps will be taken in the near future in preparation for the celebration in Ealing of the coronation of King Edward VIII, which has been fixed for next May.

Cir. Chilton moved the reference back, said that the recommendation "I find myself very much in sympathy with what I am sure is in the mind of the Victoria Hall Committee in recommending this." He said, "I am afraid, however, that the committee has not fully appreciated the probable effect of such a recommendation. I am fearful that the organisations will be able to point to the Council as having prevented them from expressing their views. I can visualise the Ealing Conservative Association holding a meeting and Communists and Fascists disturbing it. This might lead to a good deal of disorder. Would it then be desirable for the Council that the Conservative Association should be forbidden to use the hall?"

A PUNISHMENT.

Cir. Grant, seconding the reference back, said that the recommendation was a punishment for something that had occurred recently. As it was voted, the recommendation meant that the two organisations would be barred from holding meetings in the halls for a time.

Cir. Cato (chairman of the Victoria Hall Committee): We as trustees of the halls have a public duty. We have to protect these halls and protect the people who use them.
