FUNERAL OF MRS. MARY CATO

CHURCH WORKER FOR 26 YEARS

Mrs. Mary Cato, 84-years-old mother of Councillor W. H. Cato, was buried at Westminster Cemetery, Harwell, on Thursday.

Mrs. Cato, who lived at 22, Blondin-avenue, Ealing, died at her son's home, 22, Woodville-road, Ealing, on Friday, after an illness of several months.

She had been a member of West Ealing Baptist Church for 26 years, during the whole of her residence in Ealing. She was also a member and worker of the Women's Own attached to the church.

Mrs. Cato was born at Marylebone, and married at Faced-street Chapel in 1876. Soon after, they removed to Chiswick, and founded the business now known as William Cato and Sons, Ltd. After the death of her husband, in 1912, Mrs. Cato came to live in Ealing.

The funeral service was held at West Ealing Baptist Church and conducted by Rev. A. E. Willmott.
